














Opening Song: Hands Go Up

Learning Continues at Home!



Vocabulary (knowing the meanings of words including objects, concepts, feelings, actions, and ideas)

The language of nursery rhymes and books is different from the language of conversation. Rhymes and books often have one or two unusual words, ones that children don't hear in regular conversation. Having a large vocabulary helps children understand what they hear and what they will later read. Remember, don't replace those unfamiliar words, explain them.

Walking Water Color Experiment

Line up 7 cups, and fill every other cup with water. The outside glasses don't need quite as much water as the inside two. Add several drops of food coloring to the water - a different color for each glass. Try different combinations! Take a paper towel and fold it in half lengthwise. Then, fold it in half again. Then fold it in half horizontally. Cut a small portion of the bottom ends of the paper towel off, so it just touches the bottom of the glass. Take the paper towel and put one end in a glass with water and one end in the next glass that's empty. Do this for each glass in the row. Then, wait about 2 hours to see what happens!


