


Theme: Pumpkins!




Today's books:

All the leaves are falling down It is fall!




Take the rake and rake them up, rake them up, rake them up... (pretend to rake)

There is a strong connection between reading and writing. When children are given a chance to explore scribbling, draw pictures, and tell stories, they are learning reading skills...Allowing children to practice making lines, curves, and circles will later inspire them to write letters on purpose.
