Sticky Collages

Children of almost all ages can make a collage! You'll need clear contact paper, sticky tape, and scrap items, such as cut-up pieces of paper, felt, or tissues. Cut a large piece of contact paper, remove the paper backing, and use tape to attach the non-sticky side to a window, baking sheet, or some other surface your child can easily reach. If you have a young child, model sticking one or two of the scraps to the contact paper, and talk about what you're doing: "Pick up the paper, then pat, pat, pat!"
