












Songs

Time for bed, time for bed (tap watch on wrist)


Fluff up the pillow (pretend to fluff pillow)

Did you know that singing is one way to help children learn the sounds in language which will then help them hear sounds as they learn to sound out words? Songs have a distinct note for each syllable so children hear the rhythm of language and hear words broken down into parts.





