














Opening song - Hands Go Up

Two little birds flying in the sky.


One named Low and one named High.

Learning Continues at Home

Early Literacy Skill: Phonological Awareness (breaking words apart & hearing beginning sounds)

Play with the rhyming words in the story! After reading a book, take a word from a book and play with one of the words in the story. Find what rhymes with it, what words start with the same sounds, and so forth.


Words that Rhyme! Use this rhyming game to help children develop gross motor skills.

You will need: 4 hula hoops (or other ring-like objects), plastic plates, marker

- 1. Choose 4 basic rhyming words to go on the plates. (One word per plate). You could even use some words from the books we read today! For example: bake, car, hat, or band. Write the words on the plates.
- 2. Then write other rhyming options on the other plates do as many as you think your child's attention span will allow.
- 3. Place the 4 basic words in the middle of the hula hoops on the ground (one word per hoop). Hide the other words around your play area.
- 4. Instruct your kids to look for the words that rhyme with their word in the hula hoop. If playing with more than one child, sometimes it works best to assign each child a word for which they need to find rhyming words.
- * To modify this activity for babies and toddlers, use pictures of things that rhyme rather than words.
